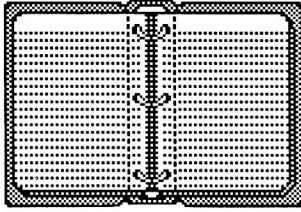


Welcome

The *Works of Art™ Education Series Sampler* takes you on an adventure in learning. Inside you'll discover over 500 superb illustrations which cover a wide variety of subjects. You'll enjoy using this artwork to illustrate your reports, create exciting classroom handouts or club fliers. Even if you aren't in school you'll find this package of art impressive and fun to use.

This manual explains step by step how to import artwork into your documents. In addition, the catalog section lists the art categories and shows the art at actual size. The catalog makes it easy to select the piece of art you want to use. (The size of the art may vary slightly, depending on your brand of printer. All art in this manual was printed on a laser printer in draft mode.)

The artwork is organized into categories and arranged on "pages." The page names that you see in this manual are the same as the ones you will see in the Import Graphics command of Springboard Publisher.™ They are in alphabetical order for easy access. Some artwork, such as the dinosaurs on page 17 in this manual is labeled to help you identify each individual piece of art. The labels appear only in this manual; they are not part of the artwork.




Instructions

You can import artwork from this disk using the same procedure that you have used to import artwork from the Springboard Publisher master program disk. There are two ways to import artwork into a Springboard Publisher document:

- You can select an existing graphics frame and then import the artwork into that frame.
- or
- You can have the program create a new frame for the imported artwork.

The step-by-step instructions below assume that you already know how to use the Springboard Publisher program. See the Springboard Publisher *Getting Started* and *Reference* manuals if you need help in operating the program.

1. Look in this booklet to find the piece of artwork you want. Remember the page name.
2. If you want to import the artwork into an existing graphics frame, select that frame by clicking in it. If you want the program to create a frame for the artwork, then make sure that no graphics frame is selected.
3. Choose the Import Graphics command from the  menu.
4. Replace the program disk with the *Works of Art* disk, then click the New disk button.

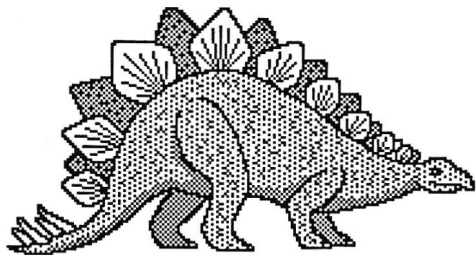
5. From the list of page names, click on the desired name, then click Open. Use the scroll bar, if necessary, to reveal more page names.
6. If you want one entire piece of artwork, double-click on that piece. If you want only part of a piece or if you want two or more pieces, drag the pointer so that it encloses the artwork you want. If you chose the wrong page by mistake, click the Close box or press Esc.
7. Choose the Copy (⌘-C) command from the Edit menu. The program closes the page of art and returns to your document.
8. Choose the Paste (⌘-V) command from the Edit menu. The program puts the artwork into your document.
9. Put the pointer on the artwork, if desired, and drag the artwork to its final location.

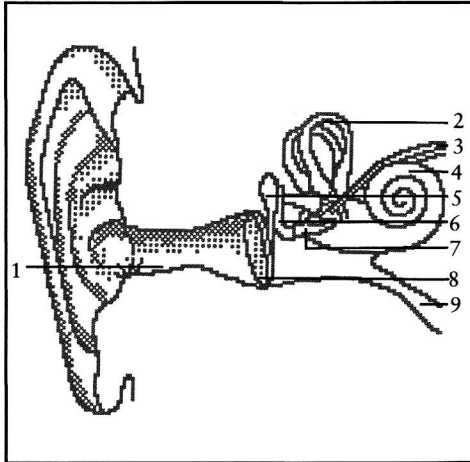

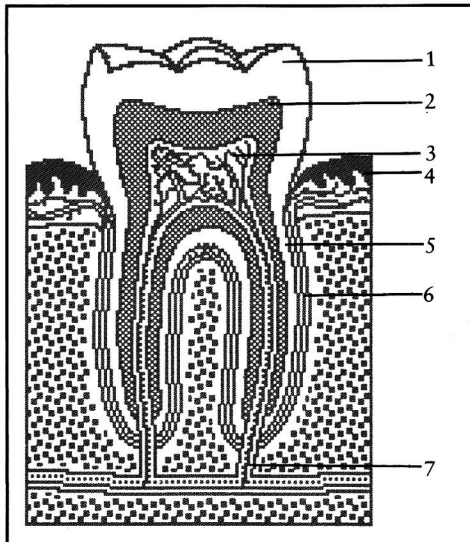

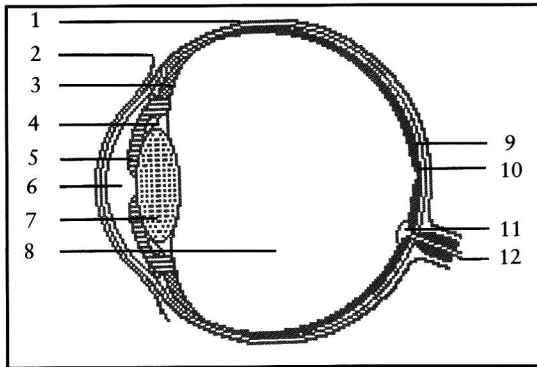

Cross-section of molar



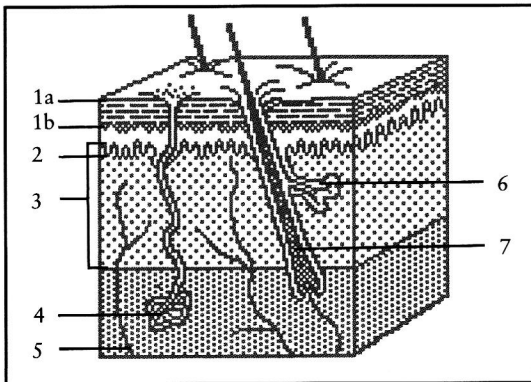

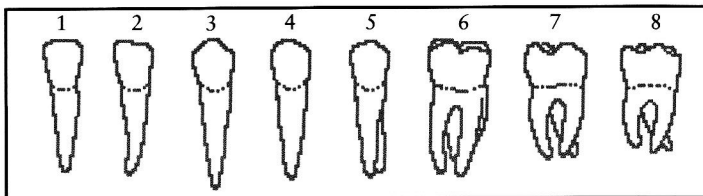

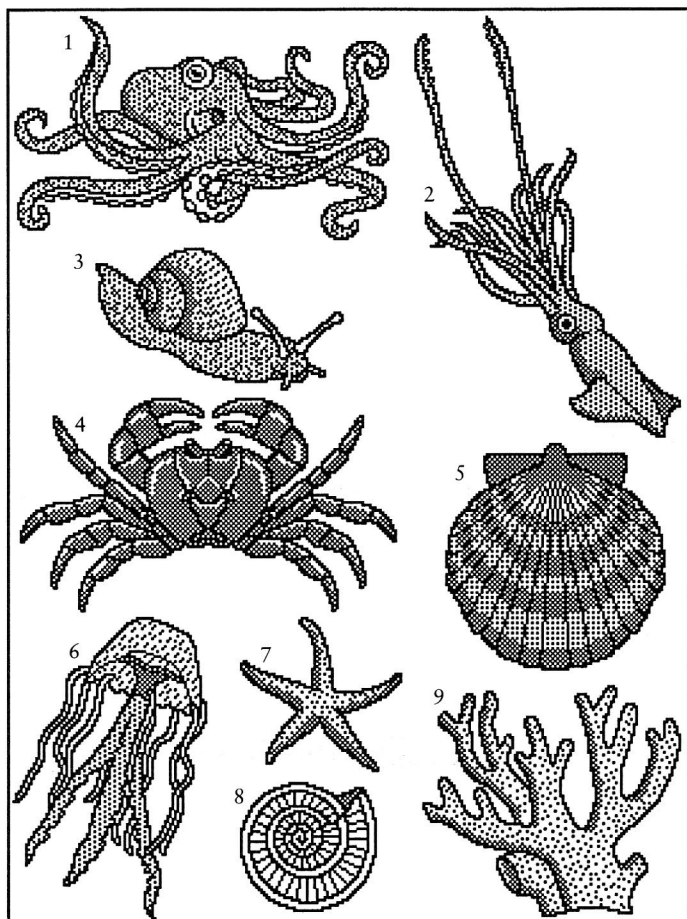
