
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
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

Apple IIGS Starts to Awaken

Hummmmm. Maybe I spoke too soon. The Apple IIGS just might be on the verge of coming alive. Since its introduction just over a year ago, we've been watching the magazines and attending many of these IIGS SIG meetings, hoping for a glimpse that things would start to show for this promising machine.

Ahhhhh. Looks like it's starting to happen!

Dick Peterson, chairperson for the SIG, faced about 20 GS users at the September meeting. Seems that there's a few more faces each month. And if what we saw is typical, more will be coming to discover new stuff to tap the resources of the GS. Opening remarks by Dick included a brief statement of the purpose of the group, which is educating GS users about this latest Apple II product.

Q/A's to start the discussion.

- One of the best music programs is "The Music Studio". It's easy to work with to enter music and play it back, but does come up a bit short on the printed output.
- PaintWorks Plus is now out in a new revision. This one works with the LaserWriter, has an improved lasso, adjustable border colors and a less formidable protection scheme. (You can now make a backup.) The non-Plus version does not work with the Apple SuperSerial card.
- AppleWriter 2.0 needs a special "patch" to print out properly on the GS. Check with other SIG members for a copy. Be aware, though. If you install the patch, it cancels the modem feature of the program.
- Apple has notified GS owners of some chip upgrades. There's also some new system software making the rounds. As you search out this stuff, be sure to verify what's what with the amount of memory that you have on board. Some is intended only for the 512K (or greater) configuration.
- Also making a belated appearance, but a signal that things may be picking up, is the ProDOS 16 operating system.
- Apple has been ragged on for forgetting to put enough speed into the GS in the stock delivery mode. This is now being addressed by some third party developers. Look for an accelerator board at a location near you soon!

The education begins.

Dick was trying to show off a Turbo Mouse as

part of the "what's new" demos for the evening. It's one of those things that is simple, but does take some practice to get the hang of it. Dick didn't have the hang of it, and quickly reverted to the mouse. He also loaded in Diversi Cache. One of those things that you can't see, but it helps to make your life faster/better on the GS. It tucks things away in memory, reducing the need to access the disk.

We also saw a demo of Visualizer, a program that takes data out of your AppleWorks program and draws graphs or charts for you... in color, of course. They looked great. A pleasant change from the monolithic color schemes that one usually sees with AppleWorks.

Another new program on the scene is SoftSwitch. This allows you (and your GS' big memory) to tuck more than one program into memory. You "switch" from one to the other and avoid the time of going back to the desktop to start another program.

Always the hacker in us has to show up somehow. Tonight it was one "graduate" from the non-GS series. He still has a 5.25" disk and wants to use it for more than just a doorstop. Seems all that's needed is a cable. But oh!, what a mess of lines to keep straight if you need to hand-build it!

And for the windup, someone passed along a "fortune cookie" that you can look for in your GS. By holding down the Apple/shift/option/M keys (that's a real handful!), you should get a surprise!

TTThat's all, ffolks!

More GS stuff is on the horizon. There's good times ahead. Stay in touch with the SIG to be sure that you are one of the first to hear about what's new.

A Column For Users Of AppleWorks

TIMEOUT Products Not Shipped

I had expected to have the new TIMEOUT AppleWorks enhancement series from Beagle Bros. by this time (October 3rd), but they have not been shipped yet. I continue to wait eagerly.

MultiRam Software Update

Checkmate has released an upgrade to Version 5.1 of their AppleWorks expander software. This version contains several improvements. One of these I have advocated for several months. This is RESET protection. If RESET is pressed, AppleWorks which has been expanded with version 5.1, will not crash. Checkmate also says if you experience a system crash into the Monitor, pressing CONTROL-RESET may restart the program. If you succeed in restarting, immediately rename any open files, save them, exit AppleWorks and restart the program. The only occasion I have had to try to restart was when AppleWorks frozen. The attempt was not successful. I have not had occasion to try to recover from a system crash yet.

This "expand" utility sets nine flags in the AppleWorks startup file, APLWORKS.SYSTEM. These flags can be toggled to activate them. They control some of the new features placed in the expanded AppleWorks.

After expanding AppleWorks, an additional utility file may be run. Checkmate has made it easy to do this additional step. Although it is necessary to run the flag setting file from BASIC, this file is on the same side of the disk as the expand utility and there is a menu choice to exit to BASIC.

RUN PATCH.PATCH

The flag setting file is named PATCH.PATCH. With this file, changes (patches) can be made and removed later, without starting the entire process over. This permits changing the expanded AppleWorks to adjust for changes in the user's computer system or operation. The user is stepped thru a series of questions to toggle features and control the startup flow.

Persons who use AppleWorks with a 3.5" disk, RAM disk, Hard Disk or Clock card can choose to skip the stop to change to the Program disk and enter the date.

If the user does not need to change the

maximum size of the database, the stop at the MultiRam Option screen can be skipped. If AppleWorks version 2.0 is being started from a RAM drive, loading the program into memory a second time can be prevented.

There are some added options that can be selected regarding where and how the date is displayed.

Most users of the Checkmate expanded AppleWorks like presence of the Memory access indicator in the lower right of the screen. This flashes an inverse character showing which bank of memory is being accessed. The purpose of the indicator is to show that the program is active. It is a positive indication of activity when doing sorts, replaces, recalculations etc. A few persons do not like this indicator. With PATCH.PATCH, it can be turned off.

With the release of AppleWorks 2.0, the Nul character @ cannot be entered in printer setups. PATCH.PATCH will correct this problem for those who need to use the Nul @ character in custom printer setups.

This expander upgrade made it easy for me to remove the stops when starting AppleWorks and prevent it from loading into memory when running from my RAM drive. These are things which I was doing, or trying to do with some of the patches I have described here in the last month or two. It is simpler to use PATCH.PATCH to choose how to customize the AppleWorks startup sequence than to use individual patches. The ability to go back and change the choices made is a big plus. I salute Checkmate for the friendliness of this patch utility!

The upgrade to this Version 5.1 of the Checkmate AppleWorks Expand utility is available from Checkmate dealers.

Printing More Than 9 Copies

Previously I have been asked if it was possible to print more than 9 copies of a document at one time. Since I knew of no way to change the limit of 9 copies, the way to get more than 9 copies was to duplicate the text within the document or data base and before printing it. Macro commands can also be used to get past this limit.

A patch from Alan Bird of Beagle Bros/Software Touch (via the Open-Apple newsletter) will allow choosing up to 255 copies when printing. I have tried this with AppleWorks 2.0 briefly. It seems to work. Use a backup

copy if you try this, or any patch.

Patch to change the maximum number of copies to 255:

Run the BASIC.SYSTEM file. This will put you in BASIC. Place the AppleWorks Program disk in a drive. Catalog the disk (CATALOG,S6,D1 or slot and drive number being used) and check that the file SEG.M1 is on the disk in the drive.

From BASIC enter: POKE 768,255

Then for AppleWorks 2.0 enter:

BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B36074for WP
BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B9185for DB
BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B65895for SS

For AppleWorks 1.3 enter:

BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B34253for WP
BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B9151for DB
BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B67332for SS

For AppleWorks 1.2 enter:

BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B34049for WP
BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B9151for I
BSAVE SEG.M1,T\$00,L1,A768,B67095for S

Those are "zeros", not "Oh" characters in these lines. Be careful.

Do not enter the labels at the end of each line shown. They are only to show which module will be changed. It should not be necessary to enter all lines if you do not want to change the 9 copy limit of a given module. This patch should allow entering a value up to 255 when making copies.

Software News

With all the hot muggy 'Dog Days' hopefully behind us, we will try to turn our attention to what may be the 'Demo Days' of fall/winter. Our thanks to Broderbund Software for their presentation at our July meeting. They also left a number of demo disks for the club's library.

We also have a demo disk of StyleWare's Multiscribe GS word processing program. It requires 512k of memory to run on the IIGS.

This particular demo moves the Apple II software into a new area for the club, 3.5 inch disks. Pricing for IIGS software requiring 800k disks will be the same as current pricing for Mac 400k disks. Not all IIGS software will require the 3.5 inch disks, other IIGS software will still be distributed in ProDOS format on 5.25 inch disks at current prices.



ANIMATE - This is a self-running demo disk that shows the many features of Animate. This program lets you take your drawings and designs (including those created with Dazzle Draw) and turn them into double hi-res animations, complete with sound and text for the Apple II+, IIc and IIGS with 128k.

DAZZLE DRAW - Self-running demo is a double hi-res drawing program for the Apple II+, IIc and IIGS with 128k of memory. Allows professional designers to produce sophisticated and high-quality graphics, prints and slides while bringing out the artist in any beginner.

FANTAVISION - Self-running demo of a program that allows you to create cartoons, special effects and complete motion pictures. This program uses a technique called 'tweening' that will automatically generate up to 64 'in-between' frames to make your first picture turn into your second. For the Apple II+, IIc, IIc with 64k; and new version coming for the IIGS.


SCIENCE TOOLKIT - Self-running demo of the program that turns your Apple II computer into a science lab. The full program package comes with a light probe and a temperature probe. The software includes an on-screen timer, thermometer, light meter and

strip chart. 2 additional modules are available to add to the Toolkit as well as a special school edition with teacher's guide for classroom use. For Apple II+, IIe, IIc and IIGS with 64k memory.

WHERE IN THE U.S.A. IS CARMEN SANDIEGO? - Interactive demo disk where you become the 'gumshoe' and try to track down the villain Carmen SanDiego. Takes you on a chase across all 50 states. Interesting way to learn about the United States. For Apple II+, IIe, IIc and IIGS with 64k memory.



MultiScribe GS is a full-feature word processor for the IIGS, giving you all the word processing power of the Mac (that's what the author thinks—Ed.) plus the ability to add color and hi-res graphics. This demo is a selected feature demo, in that some of the functions have been stubbed out. You can, however, do a great deal with this demo and get a very good feel for the abilities of the program. For the Apple IIGS with 512k of memory. Please note that this disk is distributed in the 3.5 inch format.



For the IIGS is **DOM #69** from the International Apple Core (IAC). This disk contains a number of Desk Accessories, or DA's, most being classic DA's (CDA's) and a New DA (NDA). Included on the disk is the source for each of the DA's for those of you who would like to see how they are written. The source code does contain some amount of comments. In last month's newsletter, I mentioned that the documentation was a little scarce on the disk and that I would try add something before releasing this disk. Well to the rescue came A+. Their September issue contained a feature article on DA's and the DA's on this disk in particular. So, between gleaning information from the IIGS reference manuals and some help on the individual DA's from A+, I've been able to add a little bit of information to get you started with IIGS DA's. Please look for this article in a future edition of this newsletter

Here's a quick summary of the DA's on IAC69:

Calendar - by Glen Bredon - Displays a monthly calendar with diamond identifying current day within the month. Uses left/right and up/down arrows to select months or years.

HDB.Convert - by Bill Ruff - Does number conversions between Hexadecimal, Decimal and Binary number systems.

Master.DA - by Glen Bredon - The IIGS is currently limited by system software to 14 CDA's. This CDA takes up only one CDA slot but can control up to 100 additional DA's.

Meltdown - (The NDA) by Jason Harper - Simulates your screen melting in the summer sun.

MTRemover - by Jason Harper - Removes MouseText characters from old programs that don't handle MouseText properly.

Notepad - by Glen Bredon - Lets you jot down notes and later save them to disk.

Ratcalc - by Glen Bredon - RPN Calculator

Typeit - by Glen Bredon - Allows you to enter a line of text and then send it to the printer when RETURN is pressed (aka Typewriter).

Visibell - by Jason Harper - Replaces the CTRL-G beep by causing the border area to flash in opposite color.

Also included are some utilities to convert Atari ST graphics files to IIGS format.



To round out the month, we have an upgraded version of the communications program **Talk Is Cheap** from the IAC. This particular version is 1.22. Previous club version was version 0.35. To receive an upgrade, bring your Mini'app'les copy to the DOM sales person for an exchange at a club meeting, or send it to the club's P.O. box along with \$1.00 to cover handling and return postage.

My son WON a rather complete //gs system, so I don't have an investment to protect or bias my observations (though I don't claim that my opinions are UNbiased!).

I had an Apple II system for several years, before moving to Mac. The family made good use of it and felt that it served our needs well...WP, games, art and music, with a little BASIC programming tossed in.

Although the II pales before the gs, I feel that the gs is but a shadow of what it should (or still could!) be. On the curve of what is available in today's market place, I classify the gs as 1.) slow to a fault, 2.) overpriced by 20-40%... depending on if you are looking at a "deal" or looking at list, 3.) lacking development support from Apple Corporate, and 4.) lacking development support from third party developers.

The potential for a truly great machine is there, believe it or not. The graphics are good (in resolution and color), the Ensoniq sound chip holds a wild and wooly caress locked within its silicon, and the package that contains it all looks neat.

In the year that the machine has been out, there's precious little software developed for the gs, leaving little more than //e

software, which you might as well run on the e or c anyway (THE program is AppleWorks, and that does not use the gs features except for the higher available clock rate). Programs that use the gs in the "Mac-ish" interface mode are no match for the real MacThing. (I'd be happy to buy a comparable program just to get the kid off of my Mac, but I haven't seen a look-alike with enough speed to be reasonable. If I wouldn't use it on the gs, I'm not going to foist it on him!)

It depends on what you need/want the computer for, of course. If there's a gs feature that is right up your alley, then look hard at this and see if you can live with it for quite some time, for I don't think that there's much "new" that will be rushing to the shelves. If you've got a II program inventory, it WILL let you move a lot of it forward, but not 100%. If you are looking to move to a gs from nothing (not likely, since you dialed in to TCCN) or another (smaller/older) computer, I'd look REAL hard at other possibilities... Tandy, Atari, Amiga et al. If you are looking for your first computer, and looking for more serious output, along with a lot of fun, then the Mac is where it's at.



Mac Users Face Double Vision

“Sometimes things are not as they seem”, said Alice. Or was that me, at the latest Mac User meeting? Yes, I think that it was I! The Limelight played tricks up on the wall, showing first one face in its green hue, and it was HyperCard, right? Whoops, no, maybe it was 4th Dimension, or was it 4th Dimension *pretending* to be HyperCard?

Every once in a while, I run across a meeting that is very hard to fit into a nice little cubbyhole... hard to make sense out of my notes and tell you what it was all about. And for me to be at a loss for words!! Well, that's about like saying that a toad ain't got warts!

David Stovall slipped us into the start of the meeting just as though there would be nothing unusual on this cool, crisp October meeting night. The place was familiar... the Southdale/Hennepin Library. So were the 100 or so faces, seen so many times at other Mac meetings. Announcements were exciting, with lots of neat program features coming up. Big names, like Bill Atkinson and Dan Winkler, Apple/Mac/HyperCard gurus (check the calendar for the November 19th meeting!). And have you been following the Mac eDOM story? They're all revamped, cleaned up and selling for less! One of the newies is a HyperCard Stack, too. The first Mac eDOM that's out on an 800K disk.

... still no hint of schizoids ahead.

Rambling through the new-member introductions brought forth about 10 new faces who said “hello” to the club. Heavy hitters with desktop publishing, technical manuals, electronic circuit design, company business management, video scripting, solid modeling, golf tournament results and a student making practical word processing use with his Mac, just to keep us focused on reality.

Dave had to pull a little delay at the front end tonight. Mike Carlson, co-chair for the group, was out selling Macs and had the Limelight with him. All of Dave's corporate-Apple connections (read “Curtis Juliber”) are off playing in the sand on the beaches of Hawaii. (Egad! It sure must be tough to have to attend those sales meetings. Nothing but work, work, work!) Mike must have made it a quick sale, for he soon trudged in and the hardware setup proceeded while Dave shifted to the Q/A session. Here's from the trusty spiral binder:

- Any recommendation on an 800K floppy alternate to Apple's product? Some of the other brands might save a hundred bucks

or so, but the true Mac Users in the crowd urged the questioner to go the other way... spend a hundred (or two!) more and get a hard disk. So much more storage per buck, and SPEED!

- Following right on his heels was news that a Mac User has a Mirror 40/40 (40 MB disk with 40 MB tape backup) for sale. Interested? Contact Dave or Keith Madonna on how to get in touch with this Mac User infected with technolust. He's selling to jump up to an 80 MB disk.
- Printer problems: One user can't get HyperCard to behave when printing... always bombs the system. Sorry, but others are not experiencing this trouble, so no hints on a fix, other than “keep trying.” Another new-to-Mac user (Ed, you know who you are) is finding his ImageWriter II prints out very tacky looking text unless he uses bold style. Boy! I thought that we were 'sposed to help these guys... a bunch of dummies tonight. No one came up with good suggestions for any of these.
- Unusual quantity of “bombs” with Mirror drives on an AppleTalk network. The program MailCenter seems to have some influence in the pyrotechnics display.
- Need to replace spaces with tabs, or verse the vice, in a plain vanilla text file? Check out a PD or shareware program called Add/Strip. Neat way to tweak the file to your liking.
- Heard of MacVision or ProVision? Let's you capture video images on your Mac. One User had good results with MacVision. Fast enough to play with the settings and recapture the image if the first one doesn't suit you.
- Interface a cash register with your Mac? Geez! Mine's already half way there. The money goes in, but I can't get any out!
- Jasmine 20 starts real slow for one User. Try reformatting, maybe even twice in a row, to lock out any bad tracks.

Dave brings in the developers...

The program for the evening featured two local program developers: Geoff Wattles, president of Cogmatics, and Jeff Brown of Steinmetz and Brown. Their task was to tell us what 4th Dimension is REALLY like (you know, kind of like asking Ed about Johnny). Guy Kawasaki played his August demo like a Svengalli... it looked so nice and easy that we really wanted to know if it was believable. Curtis' presentation of HyperCard shortly thereafter left a lot of folks asking “what's the

difference?” between the two. Geoff and Jeff addressed these issues and rambled through some quick looks at the programs in the background.

That's when it started to happen.

Are you seeing what you're seeing?

Jeff started off with some positioning comments about HyperCard. He likened it to BASIC on the Apple years ago. For one who has made the transition between systems, I think he hit on a pretty close analogy. BASIC was the “tool” that almost anyone could hack with, to make that special little program only YOU needed for that special little task you just hated to repeat and repeat and repeat... HyperCard is a much different tool, but in many ways it serves a similar purpose. With a unique simplicity, you cut and paste your way to new freedom, copying a button from here, pasting a script over there, linking a field to something else. And the “scripts” (little programs) are hauntingly English-like in their makeup. Even Grandma might understand what the instruction is telling the program to do.

This is a great contrast to 4D, which is more Pascal-like in its structure. You are faced with the task of learning how to make the program work *before* you can make it work. Even though both manage data, pictures and information, they do it in vastly different ways. HyperCard is a crazy-quilt of buttons, enabling jumps from card to card and from stack to stack. It's also a like a kid's playhouse of cartons and crates... every room is a new adventure for you to make into something of your choice, by following the label on the wall... or perhaps peek under the label, for there may be a hidden button, unknown and yet to be discovered, that does something completely different.

Geoff felt that 4D needs the speed of the Mac II to come to life and that it fits the traditional definition of “database” more closely than HyperCard. Reports in 4D are something to collect the data, organize it, and present it in a structured form for consumption. HyperCard seems ill at ease unless jumping from stack to stack, screen to screen. Trying to do a HyperCard report is like stuffing toothpaste back in the tube.

As this discussion ebbed back and forth, and particularly as Dave described the goodies on the HyperStack Mac eDOM, Geoff was running the hard drives through their exercise






Artisto+ 2.01 — (DA) (shareware: \$5.00 or \$10.00 suggested; 18,944 bytes including documentation) This is a new version of the great "Art Grabber" DA by Tom Taylor.

This is an update of version 1.42 on MacEDOM #30. Now reads PICT files in addition to MacPaint and FullPaint docs. It allows you to open up a MacPaint document (or MacDraw document saved in PICT format) from inside any program that supports desk accessories, select any portion of the image and copy it into the clipboard. Must have at least 512K to use.




Disktop 1.2 — (DA) (33,783 bytes) An evaluation copy of a program that acts like a Finder. For \$39.95 you can get version

2.0, LaserStatus, and Widgets, which apparently offer a far wider array of commands. After bringing up DiskTop, double click on the disk icon to see its contents and all the things you can do. No documentation.



I Ching — (Public Domain version; \$15 for more complete version, 41,104 bytes) The ancient Book of Philosophy and Divination,

or for those of us who do not have a fortune cookie around. Boot it up and throw the sticks to find your place in the cosmos each day. No documentation needed.




Lets Get Tanked v1.0 — (Public Domain, 53,422 bytes) A tank duel between you and the computer. You can choose an open playing

field or with bunkers to block the shots. The only game on the disk. No documentation needed.



MortCalc v1.81 — (shareware: donation, 75,594 bytes) A stand alone monthly mortgage comparison program with

several different ways to find where your money is going. A great way to project how much money you are paying on interest on a given loan, or before you buy that shiny new car. Documentation is included. Also has the ability to do an amortization schedule, supports printing, and is simple to use.



Patterns — (shareware \$20, 6,656 bytes) An application that produces dynamic patterns on the screen. Lines, rectangles,

or ovals can be produced. Clicking the mouse will show several controls available for number of bounces, delay before erase, number of copies active at any one time, etc. Very nice and pretty.




SafeLaunch — (shareware: \$5 for the entire family, 78,848 bytes including documentation) This is a family of app/doc

launchers that close the current application normally before launching. They provide the fastest way to move from application to appli-

cation and are also very safe. The family consists of utilities, a DA, and an FKEY. You can make a set of launch keys for your favorite applications and documents and thus have an ever present app/doc launching menu. Documentation (3 pieces!) is in MacWrite format.




Show Version 1.0 by Eli Bishop. A Public Domain (?) utility (4404 bytes) which presents a standard search-for-a-file dialog box and lets you indicate which application or System file you want to find the version of.



Smallview 1.2 is a shareware (\$12) application (25,118 bytes) which displays a month-at-a-time calendar and permits up to

10 to-do notes for each day. Good through the year 2039. One can print the to-do lists, the current month, or the entire calendar. One can also "Transfer..." to any other application. Very easy to use; no documentation.



ViewPaint 1.5 is a shareware application (\$5, 25,200 bytes) which considerably updates version 1.1 on MacEDOM #16.

This is a utility for Paint & StartUpScreen files. Allows you to view, print and convert between the different file types. For Paint style documents you see the entire image by scrolling if you don't have a large screen. This version adds printing, compatibility with ADB keyboards, improved large-screen capability and about 9K worth of built-in documentation. It also allows you to use it as sort of a slide show application.




DeskTop Publishing Talk



eDOM #801 contains a varied assortment of stackware for you to explore. Many of the "stacks" were downloaded by Dave from CompuServe and/or GENie. These stacks are briefly described below. Many of them contain their own more detailed documentation.


As a departure from our normal eDOMs, we are utilizing the full 800K of the floppy disk for two reasons. First, Hypercard will only work on Macs with 800K floppy drives. Thus there is no reason to ensure use with 400K drive Macs. Second, stackware tends to be rather large in size and we anticipate future stacks considerably larger than 400K in size on our eDOMs. Beginning with this eDOM, all future 800K eDOM's will be identified by an '800' disk identification number.



HyperMacintalk - Everything you need to know to make your stacks "talk."



Sound Convert - Convert SoundWave™ files to "snd" files for your stacks.



Common Sounds - 12 useful common sounds (snd's) for stacks.



Menus For Hypercard™ - Put your own menu in the menu bar of your stacks.



Deprotect - A stack that will strip the password of other stacks.




Stackware Detective - Extract scripts from other stacks.




Merge Stacks - Merge separate stacks into one stack.




Resource Copier - Stack that does what it says.




YAM - Yet Another Mini-Finder loaded with useful external commands.



TestXFCN - This one quickly shows you external functions.




Hypertalk Tutorial - Quick learning tool for Hypertalk.



Spreadsheet Construction Set - Not Excel, but useful.




Genealogy - A stack worksheet conforming to standard format.

aerobics. He flipped through HyperCard and 4D with demos that must have been specially designed to look like each other... chameleons darting in and out of the drives, hiding among the cables and turning platinum on the case. HyperCard, 4th Dimension, Card 4th, Hyper-Dimension... they all became a blur in elfish green, and a bit fuzzy around the edges.

Shaking my head cleared the chameleons, at least from my ears... my eyes still couldn't tell me what was what. Jeff and Geoff summed up: the two programs DO have many similarities, yet contradict this with striking differences. The intended users of the two programs are very different... developers organizing data that must be managed for business with 4D, and the Happy Hacker bringing order to an eclectic hodgepodge of fun and figures. Both are great programs, yet each has flaws that catch flack from the critics. Neither appears to be headed for extinction. Just the opposite... future upgrade possibilities could bring significant enhancements to distance these Mac innovations even farther from the blue morass.

Need info about these programs? Dave says that *Ian Abel*, another 4D developer who was scheduled to show tonight but underwent a priority transplant, has a BBS that maintains a 4D section for Q/A's. Nationally, **CompuServe** and **GENie** also feature areas, both for 4D and HyperCard, where knowledgeable programmers help with tips and answers to specific questions.



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
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
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
