



Main Mac Minutes

It was so cold, the snow crackled underfoot and the sounds of the jet airplanes snapped and popped across the sky. But inside the library, the company was warn and cheery. A few last-minute details to pick up, and then on to the presentation: WordPerfect for the Mac. Mike Carlson introduced Dave Reeves, the area's newest Sales Rep. His former territory was Hawaii. How's that for a switch? He was replacing Randy Richards, the senior sales rep. (Randy'd better be careful, Dave's pretty good!) Dave had a few introductory remarks about WordPerfect Corp and their role in the Mac market. He said WP feels that the major innovation is taking place in the Mac arena and WP wants to be part of it. He pointed out that WP was the first word processor to be System 7 Savy and they intend to continue as innovators on the Mac.

On to the Demo. Dave started setting up a newsletter by inserting a graphic header, then inserting a Word file and a text file. With the formatting bar he set three column, and put bars in the gutters. A very nice looking document in a short time. Next, he showed the newest tables options and mentioned that at this time, there are nine active mathmatical functions available, but this will be increased in the future. The last feature he showed was the mailmerge macro, allowing infor-

mation to be typed in a dialog box for insertion in the document.

Dave did a good job answering questions, considering he's more familiar with the MSDOS version of the program. He did offer to send anyone interested a technical white sheet on the program.

At the end of the demo, Dave announced that there were several door prized available. Coffee mugs for everyone, five hats that said "Mac Forever", and a copy of WordPerfect 3.0 to be given to the last membership card pulled out of the bag. Hats went to Bob Demeules, Jack Furman, John Hankens and Earl Holderage. I didn't catch the name of the fifth hat winner, but yours truly won the WordPerfect program. (Now I'll have to pay Mike that bribe I offered him...)

There were several last-minute questions before the librarian announced that the library was closing. Denis Diekhoff announced that the Pie SIG would be at a nearby Perkins. I would have gone except I had to go and help my neighbor get his Mac working... which it did.

The New Version: HyperCard 2.2 is here!

On December 13, 1993 Apple announced HyperCard 2.2. The new version is significantly enhanced from previous versions. Concurrent with the introduction of HyperCard 2.2, is the transition of technical support from Claris Corporation to Apple.

Enhancements in HyperCard 2.2

- Contains improvements and additions to HyperTalk and HyperCard's ability to create attractive interfaces
- Color can be added to all HyperCard objects
- Open Scripting Architecture (OSA) compliant
- Can create standalone applications that do not require HyperCard or HyperCard Player.
- New Buttons! Pop-up, oval, and disabled buttons.
- New report printing feature.
- New visual effects.
- Balloon help has been integrated into HyperCard's menus.
- ColorTools stack allows users to select from a palette of 256 shades to color HyperCard elements such as buttons, fields, cards and backgrounds to enhance the usability and visual appeal of their stacks.
- Includes AppleScript 1.1 which enables users to automate repetitive tasks by launching, controlling and exchanging data with Macintosh applications.
- Includes AddMotion II for creating color animations.

We'll look at the new HyperCard at the meeting. Plenty of room for all and an overhead will ensure your viewing pleasure. Hope to see you all there!

Meanwhile, Brian Bantz gave a short rundown on MacWorld and new products that were expected in the near future and a schedule of PowerPC chip introductions. Tom went through the menus and described each of the functions and when they worked. He also had a viewgraph of the flow chart that's in the January Newsletter. I have always had a sneaking suspicion that even those who start out on the left side of the brain (initially changing their screen saver module with the phase of the moon) end up on the right side of the brain and leave one module playing for all eternity.

Now Bit Jugglers, a Mountain View, California start-up company has come up with a piece of software that takes the idea of a screen saver to the next level. In what appears to be the first entry of a whole new category of software that we could call computer apparel, they have introduced UnderWare.

The program comes on two disks which are easy enough to install with the product's installer program. There is an option for customizing the installation so you can install as little or as much as you want. The UnderWare program is a Control Panel Device so all selections are made there.

UnderWare is actually three products in one. It's a screen saver, a desktop pattern generator as well a dynamic desktop creator – a screen saver in active time. The first two modules do not present anything revolutionary but the dynamic desktop animator is something new and clever.

The first module, the desktop pattern mode, offers nothing new. The module is intuitive. Pushing the apply button changes the desktop. You can preview the patterns in the control panel. Seventy-five patterns (up to 128 x 128 pixels) are included on disk. None of them made me want to change the desktop pattern on my monitor. However, you can add patterns that are saved in ppat resource file form which are available from several on-line sources. Of

note there is no edit mode where you can make or edit your own patterns.

The second module is your basic screen saver mode. One advantage to UnderWare is that it can take advantage of any screen saver pattern in After Dark form. It comes with 27 different screen saver modules, most which can be used in the dynamic desktop portion of the program. You can preview these in the control panel and clicking the apply button will send the modules into action.

You can set the time before the screen saver kicks in. You can also select screen corners as *sleep* and *no sleep* positions where the screen saver will activate immediately or never, respectively.

The truly innovative portion of the program lies in its dynamic desktop mode. This module activates a number of animations that initiate while you are using your desktop. If you don't enter a keystroke after a set amount of time, a dump truck may come and empty your trash or ballerinas may pirouette across your screen. The options button also lets you restrict the animations to a certain portion of the desktop.

Twenty-six animated modules are included with UnderWare. The following are a few highlights:

Babies. Extraordinarily cute infants crawl across your screen. At times, one will stop and a thought balloon will appear over the baby's head. You can add messages to the thought balloons. Billy Bounce. This is actually my favorite module. There's this guy, Billy,

see, who bounces in 3D space off of icons, dialogue boxes – well, you'll just have to see it.

Dinosaurs. This is an aquarium for the Jurassic set.

Dragon. This medieval marauder lopes across your screen and burns holes in your desktop while at times spouts antedated wisdom in thought balloons.

Jungleman. The Jungle sprouts.

Creatures wail. Jungleman plasters himself on inconveniently placed desktop objects while swinging on a vine.

Robber. This little felon escapes with your computer's microchip and then spends time just out of reach of the long arm of the law.

I don't know if UnderWare has made me any more productive in my work. (This isn't one of the promises the company makes.) It has entertained me. At times, I sit back and just watch the animations. Now whether it's unique enough to keep stimulating the left side of my brain; that's another thing. In the mean time, I've been waiting for the pull of the right side to reel me back in. Well, that's entertainment.

UnderWare requires at least a 68020 Macintosh, 4 MBytes of RAM and System 7 or higher.

HARD DRIVES FOR APPLE IIe AND IIGS

The Roadrunner hard drive system will handle any megabyte size of the 2.5° SCSI drive series. 
