What Is Attributes ?

Attributes is a flexible program designed to alter file information using a drag-and-drop interface. Drag a set of file / folder / disk icons onto this program's icon and Attributes will change the file information according to user specification. This function only works on files. Dropping folders or disks onto Attributes will modify the information of the contents of the folders or disks.

Information that can be modified includes date and time of file creation / last modification, creator, file type, invisibility, and lock / unlock attributes. The user can operate on all files or files that matching specified criteria (such as creator, file type, etc.) while in the batch mode. If only a single file is dropped on the Attributes icon, it's characteristics can be modified interactively.



CanIt! 1.1

CanIt! is a utility which allows you to instantly trash all selected files and folders in a Finder window by pressing a command-key shortcut of your choice. No more laborious dragging files into the trash! CanIt! can be configured to leave the items in the trash, or automatically empty the trash, whichever you prefer. Requires System 7.1 or later, and an OSA-compatible Finder (i.e. you must have the Finder Scripting extension installed; this is standard with System 7.5, it can be added to 7.1).

CanIt! is completely compatible with trash-back utilities such as Norton and MacTools.



DragonDrop 1.0

System 7's drag-and-drop capabilities make moving files and launching applications much easier, but still require you to open an awful lot of folders to get to the right spot. DragonDrop makes this less of a drag. When you drag an item onto a folder, a popup menu shows you the contents of the folder, letting you navigate down through the folder hierarchy until you reach your destination. It's quick, it's economical, and it leaves no window clutter afterwards.

Note: DragonDrop is currently not fully compatible with AOCE/PowerTalk. The drag and drop functions are incompatible with the PowerTalk extensions of System 7 Pro. The launching function (hierarchical menus) will work however. A future update should fix this incompatibility.



Sleeper 2.1

Sleeper is a control panel for desktop Macs that spins down the hard disk, dims the screen, and powers off Energy Star compliant monitors after periods of inactivity. Separate "sleep" times can be set for the different features. Setting up via the control panel is straightforward, and there is help available by clicking the "Info" icon.

Please note that Sleeper is distributed through the shareware system. If you use it, please take the time to pay for your copy. It's the only way we'll be able to continue to support and improve the product, so your payment does matter!



Typelt4Me 4.6

What does Typelt4Me do?

Anytime you enter text in your Mac by typing it at the keyboard, Typelt4Me can help you do it faster and more accurately.

First you define a number of

abbreviations and the full text entries that they represent, then you watch the Mac expand them on the fly even as you continue typing!

Abbreviations can represent any text you like, such as:

- a long, hard-to-type word like 'supercalifragilisticexpialidocious' or 'benzo-methyl-tricarbo-something-or-other';
- your name and address;
- a standard end of letter salutation;
- an entire paragraph of legal or medical text;
- a short word that you often misspell (such as 'teh' instead of 'the');
- just about anything else you need to type often.

To trigger the automatic typing of the text represented by an abbreviation you can either:

* type the abbreviation

or

* select the abbreviation from Typelt4Me's pop up menu.

Even if you already use your word processor's own glossary feature or a macro utility such as Quickeys or KeyQuencer, please give Typelt4Me a try. You'll be surprised at how much easier it is to remember and type an abbreviation you make up, rather than having to memorize keyboard combinations such as control-shift-something-or-other.

Also, once you define an abbreviation, it is available at all times, anywhere text can be typed, no matter if you are using your word processor, paint program, Finder, address book or any application at all!

Occasionally I change tabs, line spacing, or margins for a portion of my word processing document and find that I'd like the same set up in another section of the same document. Trying to duplicate tabs and margins by guessing at the placement, never works, and besides, there is a much

easier way; I copy and apply the ruler. This works like the text copy and paste that you probably use frequently. Simply place the cursor in the line that has the settings you want to copy. Then select Copy Ruler from the Format menu or press Shift-Command-C. Next move the cursor to the line where you want the same settings. This time select Apply Ruler from the Format menu

or press Shift-Command-V.

My Favorite Utilities

I have been thinking (if I can find the time) of doing an article every month called "My favorite Utilities." Utilities have always been one of my favorite tools (toys) for my Mac and I have a lot of them. I think I have enough to do an article every month until the year 2000 at least.

My first article is going to cover a utility that I gave a short talk on at the Mac Main meeting in October. The name of the Utility is Clipfolio™ 1.5.1, created by SingleTrac™ software of Aurora CO.

Clipfolio is a control panel that gives you Multiple clipboards. As you know, whenever you Cut or Copy a selected item, it is added to your clipboard. When you cut or copy something else, everything you had on your Clipboard is replaced by whatever you just cut or copied. Also anytime you restart or turn your Mac

off your clipboard is erased. Clipfolio lets you keep up to 60 separate items on multiple clipboards. It can also be configured to save these items when your Mac is shutdown. How many times have you copied something to your clipboard and then needed to copy something else while still needing the first copy you made (which is now gone)? Some uses for Clipfolio are; if you move a lot of information between applications and have to keep switching back and forth to exchange information. With Clipfolio you just copy all the pieces of information you need, go to your other application and Paste them in. Another use is when you are reading mail and you want to copy a number of E-Mail addresses, URL's or quotes, you just copy and forget, going to Clipfolio later to retrieve your information and pasting it into your E-Mail, browser or document. I'm sure

you can find many other uses for this utility. Clipfolio is one of those Utilities that, once you use it you wonder how you ever lived without it.

Clipfolio works just like your clipboard, you use the same menu commands or keyboard commands to cut, copy and paste. You can configure it to save from 6 to 60 of your most recent cuts or copies. Also, as with most Control panels you have many other options that are too numerous to mention here.

Clipfolio is Shareware, which means you can try it for a while (30 days), and if you like it you can register it for \$20 (well worth the price). You can find Clipfolio on our BBS in the Mac Files Area. On America Online at Keyword- MUT> SoftwareLibraries > Control Panels dated 7/12/96. Give it a try, I think you'll like it.

MacRefuge BBS

Tired of calling BBSs that specialize in DOS and Windows for help (or a bit of fun) with your Macintosh? MacRefuge BBS is the Twin Cities'

refuge for Macintosh users.

MacRefuge BBS is run on an Apple Macintosh®, by a Macintosh user, for Macintosh users. MacRefuge uses the latest TeleFinder BBS program which makes the BBS look like an extension of your Macintosh. (To download a file, just drag it from the BBS window to your hard disk - you

can read and write messages while files are being transferred, and you can attach files on your hard disk to private messages delivered on the BBS - plus many other features.) The TeleFinder user software is free, and is available for both Macintosh and Windows users. You can also access the BBS with any text or ANSI terminal program that supports XModem or ZModem file transfer protocols.

The hardware for MacRefuge BBS consists of a PowerMac with 2 phone lines, 2 U.S. Robotics 28.8K "V.Everything" modems, 4 CD-ROM drives and 1.5 gigabytes of hard disk storage. 3 of the CD-ROM drives are always filled with the latest "AMUG BBS in a Box" set, the other drive is filled with a CD-ROM from the BBS library. The hard disks contain the best program, picture, sound and game files from 1984 to the present. MacRefuge also has a license to dis-

tribute Apple software. (But Apple seems to be dropping this program.)

MacRefuge is part of the international Fidonet network. New messages are delivered several times per day. Messages that you enter on the BBS are quickly delivered to other BBSs around the world where they are read (and answered) by other Macintosh enthusiasts. If you want to read messages off-line you can set the TeleFinder user software to automatically pull all of the new messages in any areas that you select to your hard disk - you can reply to them at your leisure and the next time you connect your replies will automatically be added to the BBS. MacRefuge also supports Fido style "point" software.

MacRefuge BBS is run in an adult fashion. There are no dirty pictures and bad language is not tolerated from BBS users. Files are all checked

for legality and virus infection when they are moved from the uploads area to the archives. Everyone uses their real name and must give the Sysop their phone number and address - this minimizes harassment of users. (Phone numbers and addresses are never given out.)

MacRefuge BBS offers all of this - up to 4 calls per day -or- 30 minutes per day for free. If you want more time, you can subscribe. For \$10 per year, you get up to 4 sessions per day - each an hour long. Discounts are available for students under 18 or families. Subscription money is used to defray the cost of operating, maintaining and improving the BBS.

5 Years ago...

January 1992 Circulation was 1000. The issue had 32 pages, including the covers. One of the larger articles, more than 3 pages, is a reprint of an interview with Tom Weishaar, the director of a publishing organization called Resource Central. Our president was David Laden. At the time of printing the January issue, both the treasurer's and secretary's positions were open. The newsletter editor was Michelle Johnson. Contributors to the issue included Greg Carlson, Rand Sibet, Stan Feller, Tom Edwards, and Peter Fleck.

Advertisers included RAMCO Sales (printers, printer ribbons, memory - 256K for \$16.); TCCN, a free BBS offering speeds of 300/1200/2400; Your Blue Pencil (selling an accelerator board for laser printers); Laser-print Supply (offering an HP Deskwriter C printer for \$750.); and member want ads.

10 Years ago...

January 1987. Circulation was 1550. The issue had 20 pages, including the covers. A full page advertisement describes MultiRam, an expansion for the IIe and IIc computers giving up to 1 Meg of memory and selling for \$279. Also offered is a 1200 baud modem for only \$159. Another ad offers an Epson FX-286

printer for \$525.

There were nine articles submitted by Dick Marchiafava, Steve George, Pat Edwards, Joan Kistner, and Tom Edwards.

Our president was Ann Bell, Treasurer was Earl Benser, and the Secretary was Chuck Lind. The newsletter editor was Dan Buchler.

day seminar "publish or Perish!"); Hagen (Professional service and on-site repair); House of Forms (paper); Strictly Business Show; Yukon Computer Products (software, hardware, magnetic disks); and member want ads.

15 years ago...

January 1982. Circulation was 850. The issue had 16 pages. A full page advertisement for MECC (Minnesota Educational Computer Consortium) offered nearly 60 titles, each on a 5 1/4" disk for \$5.00 each. The issue was printed almost entirely on an Epson MX-80 printer.

A large article, covering nearly two full pages, with an included pic-

ture describes the Dtask Grounded, an external board that connected to an Apple II. The combination allowed the Apple to compile code for a Motorola 68000 processor board. This allowed the 68000 to act as a 16-bit co-processor for the Apple. In one application, the Apple acts as the I/O device for the 68000 board. (I know of another person who used the Dtask as a logic controller in a power plant.)

There was a reproduction of a letter from The State of Minnesota Department of Revenue stating the sales of "canned" computer programs and custom computer programs were not subject to sales tax.

Largest K-12 Internet Project Ever...

December 3, 1996, IBM Corporation issued a press release that stated it had been selected to provide Web Site Development and Hosting for K-12 schools, teachers and students nationwide. Selected by Computers For Education (CFE), IBM will head what is to be the largest K-12 Internet project ever accomplished. It will provide each of the nations 106,000 K-12 schools with web pages, the capacity to host more than three million teacher home pages and 50 million student web pages as well as free e-mail for students, educators and parents.

The project is called The American School Directory project or ASD. It is a collaboration by CFE, IBM K-12 Education, Apple Computer Inc. and Vanderbilt University. With this project expected to go into place in early 1997, each school will have an Internet web presence that will be customized with the schools colors and mascot, and will contain information personalized to that school. Much of this can be put into place quickly through the use of pre-designed web pages. Each institution will then include their own classroom policies, schedules, school information, sporting events, etc. One of the sample

Web pages sports a living year book with electronic pictures of students and staff.

Access will be developed and maintained by Vanderbilt University and will index and link high-quality educational sites for teachers, students and parents. The sites will be hosted on IBM RS/6000-powered SP computers.

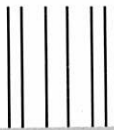
