eDOM #965 is the result of member requests for particular items.



#### Default Folder 2.6.1

Default Folder is a control panel that enhances

Open and Save dialog boxes to make it easier for you to manage files on your Macintosh. It provides many of the essential features of the commercial SuperBoomerang and Directory Assistance utilities, but without the infrequently used extras that take their toll in compatibility, memory, and CPU usage.

Default Folder's time-saving Open and Save dialog enhancements allow you to:

- Set up a default folder for any or all applications.
- Switch among recently used folders from a pop-up menu.
- See available disk space and switch between disks from a pop-up menu.
- Click on a Finder window to show it in an Open or Save dialog.
- Create folders, get information (including changing name, type, and creator), and move items to the Trash from within file dialogs.
- "Rebound" back to the last file you used.
- Make "Replace" the default option instead of "Cancel" when saving a file with the same name as an existing file.
- Speed up the display of Open and Save dialogs by turning off custom color icons in the file list.

Default Folder will operate on any Macintosh running System 7 or higher, and is accelerated for PowerPC.



#### DragAnyWindow 3.2

DragAnyWindow is a control panel that allows you to easily move any kind of window, including dialogs, alerts, standard "Open" and "Save" dialogs, game windows and other non-movable windows. It also lets you bring back to the desktop any window that has gone out of sight, or center the front window on the main screen with a single keystroke. It is very useful for old applications designed for the 9" screen (which often use fixed windows) and for moving modal dialogs and windows behind them.

### EjectDisk 2.1.0

EjectDisk is a control panel which allows you to

assign a key combination that, when pressed, will unmount and eject all floppies, CD-ROMs or

Zip/SyQuest/Jaz disks, depending on which key you press (much quicker and easier than dragging the disk to the trash). EjectDisk is different from pressing Command-Y in the Finder because you don't have to select the disk first, and you don't have to be in the Finder to eject the disk.

And of course, you can add instant hot key access to your own favorite files whether they're documents, applications, or control panels.

### QCat 1.4.3

"QCat" is a utility for cataloging disks. It creates a "TEXT" file that can be imported into any database program that supports it. It can also be searched by any program that allows searches into text files.

Network volumes are NOT yet supported.

This version is MultiFinder compatible, but for better performance I suggest using it from the Finder.

Also included is a ClarisWorks 2.0 database template (which can also be used with later versions) for processing QCat v1.4.3 produced text files.

### Tex-Edit Plus 1.8.5

Welcome to Tex-Edit Plus, my multi-window, styled text editor that fills the gap between Apple's bare-bones SimpleText and a full-featured word processor! It is particularly useful for formatting text that is transmitted to and from a BBS. Tex-Edit Plus is small, fast, easy-to-use and requires little memory. Tex-Edit Plus is Shareware (\$10).

With Tex-Edit Plus you can:

- Quickly create, edit and print styled text documents of any size (limited by RAM).
- View and print TeachText or SimpleText read-only ("ReadMe") documents.
- Easily create TeachText/SimpleText read-only documents, including embedded pictures.
- View and print color PICT files, such as those produced by draw programs or Apple's built-in screen snapshot utility.
- Copy a selection from a PICT file, cropping the image for use in the company newsletter.
- View, edit and print text docu-

- ments created by virtually any word processor or computer.
- Reformat downloaded e-mail or text, correcting word-wrap problems and removing extraneous, non-Mac characters.
- Prepare text for upload to a BBS, so that people with MS-DOS systems can view the document as it was intended to be viewed.
- Instantly quote a brief passage from received e-mail, allowing the sender to remember their original message.
- Read any text document aloud, if you have Apple's Speech Manager extension. (Listen to a SimpleText read-only file, for example, as the text and pictures scroll by!)
- Quickly optimize a document for printing, replacing generic, typewriter-era characters with professional-looking typographically correct text.
- Create simple hypertext documents.
- Insert attention-getting sound annotations to spice up ordinary inter-office mail.

eDOM #966 is a collection of three indoor games, bowling, a form of Solitaire, and air hockey.

Alley 19 1.12

Alley 19 is a simple, yet addictive bowling game.

Using the mouse, you control the bowler from the time he's sitting at the score table, to the time he throws the ball. After some practice, you should be able to control the speed and curve of the ball.

Alley 19 also includes Instant Replay, a Statitistics Board, and an accomodating waitress. Up to four players may compete.

#### Seahaven Towers™

Seahaven Towers™ is a popular form of Solitaire. It employs quite a bit of strategy and is not a particularly easy version. The graphics are very good. There is extensive online help.

### Shufflepuck

Shufflepuck is a black & white implementation of air hockey. While the graphics are not as sophisticated as some newer games, it plays very well. There is considerable control over the ability of the computer opponent. At the computer's best, it is almost impossible to score, let alone defeat the computer. But with the proper adjustments to various parameters one can become very competitive and then increase the difficulty as skills improve.

There is no documentation included so you should just experiment with what the various settings change.




Many of us learned to type on typewriters. Some of us on manual typewriters! Does that

date me? Much of what we do on a word processor we brought with us from the old days. Most of us have made use of many features available on our word processors but may be unaware of others. On a typewriter, if you used indented paragraphs, you needed to set a tab stop and then remember to hit the Tab key at the

beginning of each paragraph. There is no need for that with ClarisWorks. To set an automatic paragraph indent, drag the upside down T, found in the ruler, to the tick mark on the ruler where you want the paragraph to start. If you wish, you can set the indent more

set the indent more precisely in the Paragraph dialog box that appears when you select Paragraph... from the Format menu or when you double click on the line spacing icon in the gray bar under the ruler. Your paragraphs now are automatically indented when you press the Return key to end one paragraph and begin a new one.





### **My Favorite Utilities**

This months utility is called: Window Juggler 1.3 by Ken Broomfield.

Window Juggler is a simple system extension which makes it easy for you to use the keyboard to switch between all of the windows you've opened, across all the application programs you're using.

I'm the type of person who hates using a mouse, and often works with a lot of open windows. Window Juggler is perfect for me because with it you can switch between all your open windows with the touch of two keys. You press the Command-and Tab keys and the Juggler window opens to show you all the open windows you have in the order in which you most recently used them. While holding down the Command key press the Tab key to scroll through the open windows on your screen; release the Tab and Command keys to choose the window you want. Its that simple, and needless to say very handy when working with multiple

windows.

To install; drag WJ to your system folder Icon, when asked if you want this put in your extensions folder click yes, then Restart, you're ready to go. System Requirements are: System 7.0 or later (I use it with 7.5.5 and it works great) and 44kB of memory.

Window Juggler is shareware. Ken is asking \$19.98 (or whatever you think it's worth).

### What was happening in the Mini'app'les Newsletter

compiled by Ken Slingsby

This series is presented to provide a link to our past. The snapshots of articles and advertisements appearing in the Mini'app'les newsletters of yesterday are meant to entertain and enlighten rather than to poke fun at our past. Enjoy.

### 5 Years ago...

February 1992. A full page ad described Lotus 1-2-3, a spreadsheet which utilized the power of System 7 including Publish and Subscribe, Apple Events, Data Access Manager and Balloon Help. Your Blue Pencil offered an accelerator for laser printers. TCCN offered 15 access lines at speeds of 300/1200/2400 baud. Ramco sales offered Publish It! Easy at the special price of \$79.95 (retail \$249.95). Ramco Sales also offered several Apple II programs and chips, including Crossworks \$89.95. There were two 5 1/4" eDoms (#70 & #71) issued for the Apple II series, three 3 1/2" eDoms issued for the II GS (GS 19, 20, & 21), and three Mac eDoms, (827, 828, & 829). Tom Gates wrote an interesting article describing a home security system he built using his II GS. The organization published a three page survey attempting to obtain detailed information from club members (make and model of computers owned, education, software used, activities on the BBS, and pricing details).

### 10 Years ago...

February 1987. Hagen Office Equipment offered service for Apple and Epson products. Coit Valley Computers of Dallas Texas offered MultiRam upgrades for the Apple IIe for \$279 for 1024k, or the Apple IIc for \$354 for 1024k. Arsen Darnay and Associates offered custom programming applications support for Apple and IBM PC/XT. City Desk Computer Warehouse offered boxes of 9 1/2 X 11" paper for \$17.99. Yukon Computer Produces offered 10% and 20% off selected items on a New Year clearance. There were

three 5 1/4" D.O.Ms (including IAC #50 and #64 and the Best of Softdisk) offered for the Apple II. Softdisk was issued by a commercial vendor on a periodic basis as a type of newsletter containing trivia, games, and serious programming tools. There were five 3 1/2" DOMs (Numbers 33-37) for the Mac. Two of these disks contained games, one pertained with Iconography, one pertained with a shareware outliner application, and one was a demo of a page layout application. There was an interesting comparison of Quark EXpress and Pagemaker 2.0.

### 15 Years ago...

February 1982. A full page ad described the Microsoft Softcard, which allowed the Apple II to run the CP/M operating system, the BASIC-80 and COBOL-80 programming languages. Another full page ad listed products offered by Interactive Sales and Service. Listed were a box of 10 Maxell diskettes for \$29.00, the Softcard for #315, or a Novation Apple-Cat II modem (1200 baud) for \$340, VisiCalc for \$165, and MicroPro Wordstar for \$275. **Applied Engineering of Dallas Texas** offered an Apple 8-bit, 8-channel A/D system for monitoring analog data. The board sold for \$129. They also offered in separate advertisements, a Time II board to add clock functions to the Apple II which sold for \$129., and a 16 voice music synthesizer capable of playing in stereo as well as quadraphonic. This sold for \$159. Horizon Business and Professional Services of Chaska offered a "Furniture Quality Workspace" for \$500. The House of Forms offered a selection of paper. An interesting item in the newsletter is a listing of nearly all members, giving name, zip code, phone number, and membership number. My membership number is still the same after all these years. There was one DOM (#11) issued. This one contained a locally written program to compute your income tax and a tutorial from

the IAC (International Apple Corps - They published a magazine and their own disk of the month for a period of time.). Dan Buchler wrote several articles including one describing new products for the Apple II. Included were an Axlon RAM disk which contained 320k of battery backed RAM for \$1400. and a Practical Peripherals Microbuffer 32k printer buffer card for \$299. ### **Modems**

#### **Overview**

The explosive growth interest and popularity of the Internet has led to the growing desire to be able

to access the "super information highway". This access is provided by on-line services such as AOL (America On-line), CompuServe, Prodigy and MSN (Microsoft Network) or through a number of startup companies called ISPs (Internet Service Providers). These services are accessed in a variety of ways the most common of which is over the standard dial-up phone line. This has resulted in the need for virtually every computer to have a device that can establish a connection or link over a dial-up phone line to these services, that device is a modem. Other access methods ISDN. 56K DDS, Frame Relay, T1 and others are also available and each will be covered.

#### What is a modem?

Modems are used to establish a connection over standard dial-up telephone lines between two computers systems. This connection is called a data or communications link. A modem is required to translate the computers digital data (signals or 1s and 0s) into a telephone voice type or analog data (signals). The result is a sending computer's digital signals are converted by the modem into analog signals that can

travel over a telephone line to a modem, at receiving end, which converts the telephone lines, analog signals back into the receiving computer's digital signals. This process is called modulation and demodulation. The mane modem is describes this process.

Modems are available as either internal or external devices for a computer. An internal modem plugs into a slot in the computer and is configured to operate as a COM (serial) port. An external modem connects to a computers COM (serial) port, via a serial cable.

Communications software is then loaded on the computer and is setup to use the modem at its configured COM port location.

The use of modems is necessitated by our current phone system. A brief background explanation and terminology of the phone system will help understand the technologies used today in computer communications.

The foundation of the phone company is the copper wire that goes to each household. Most phone calls operate over two wires (tip and ring). These wires connect your phone to a central office (CO), which is responsible for detecting when you want to make a call or ringing your phone when receiving a call. This entire systems is based

around voice calls, which are analog.

The digital computer requires a device to convert its parallel digital data into serial analog data. The serial port converts the parallel data into serial data and the modem converts the digital data into analog data; a process called D to A conversion. The modem output is compatible with the analog phone lines and sends the information to the central office. New central offices (COs) are all linked by digital lines as a result the analog data they receive is converted back to digital data; a process called A to D conversion. Data is then routed to the appropriate end port CO where the data is converted back to analog and sent to the

modem in the home. The modem converts the Analog to Digital sends it to the COM ports and the computer receives the data.

So why isn't the home made digital and we can just get rid of modems? A few reasons are: All current handsets or telephones are analog they would have to be replaced. Digital signals require amplification every mile or they deteriorate. Analog signals do not require amplification. COs would have to replace their analog switching equipment with digital and rates would go up. We will try to address futures towards the end of this discussion with terms like ISDN and ADSL.

### **Quick Click Calc: A Review**

Quick Click Calc (QCC) is a spreadsheet plus business graphics program for the Apple IIGS written by Mike Westerfield and published by Byte Works, Inc. I have been working with Version 1.3.1.

The system requirements for running QCC are an Apple IIGS computer with a minimum of 1.125 megabytes of RAM, Apple IIGS Operating System (GSOS) version 6.0.1, and a floppy disk drive. QCC can be installed on and run from a hard drive.

A spreadsheet stores data (text and numbers) and performs calculations on that data. Like other spreadsheet programs for the Apple ][, QCC fulfills that mission very well. In addition, QCC includes the capability to produce pie, bar, and line charts; the charts can be saved as files and imported into other GSOS based programs such as Graphic Writer III and printed on GS compatible printers.

Like higher priced programs for higher priced computers, QCC has a graphics based window interface which is used to select commands and to enter and review all data. At the top of the window is the command menu; this menu has the standard Apple GSOS format. The remainder of the screen is filled with a spreadsheet window with a title bar at the top and with right side and bottom scroll bars which function similar to those of other GSOS applications.

A formula edit box (sometimes called the formula entry box) sits under the title bar; it is used to enter and modify all text, numbers, and formulas. The formula edit box supports Cut, Copy, and Paste operations.

The cell array is located in the center of the spreadsheet window. This area is arranged in columns and rows with columns being titled with letters and rows with numbers. QCC handles up to 32,767 columns and rows but you will probably run out

of memory before your spreadsheet reaches that size. A command is available for changing the size of the cell array within a range from 16 to 32,767 columns and rows. For a small spreadsheet, it is much easier to use the scroll bars if the spreadsheet's maximum size is not too much larger than the actual size of the array (that is, the number of cells in use). Split screen controls are located at the left of the horizontal scroll bar and at the top of the vertical scroll bar; by clicking on the controls and moving them into the cell array, you can divide the spreadsheet into separate horizontal and/or vertical areas.

A Cell Name Box is located in the upper left corner of the cell area. This box shows the location of the cell which is currently selected. By clicking on the Cell Name Box, you can deselect any cell(s) currently selected.

Since QCC displays data (text and numbers) using graphics rather than a character mode, the data can be formatted as you like it. Font, Character Size, and Color can be set for each cell in the spreadsheet or for any range of cells you select. To accommodate the different fonts and character sizes, row height and column width can be adjusted either with a command or by clicking on and moving the boundaries between rows or between columns. The style of the characters in each cell can be set to Bold, Underline, and/or Italic. The characters within each cell can be aligned to the Left, Right, or Center of the cell. Borders can be added to any or all sides of any cells desired.

QCC has several number formats available: General, Fixed, Dollar (money), Percent, Scientific notation, Date, Time, and Grade (used for a teacher's grade book). The number of decimal places displayed can be set. In addition, negative numbers can be bracketed and/or displayed in red.

The usual editing commands -

Cut, Copy, Paste, Clear - are present. An Undo command is also available; Undo returns a cell to its original formula, number, text, or format. The ultimate Undo command, Revert, is also available; Revert throws away the version of the spreadsheet now in memory and fetches the last saved version.

QCC has the ability to Publish and Subscribe to Editions. An Edition is a separate file that is used to transfer data or formulas from one spreadsheet to another. Current data is written (published) each time a spreadsheet is saved and read (subscribed to) each time a spreadsheet is opened; commands are available to publish and subscribe manually as well. For example, the checkbook balance calculated in a spreadsheet could be passed to a second spreadsheet being used to calculate one's net worth. A spreadsheet may publish and subscribe to multiple editions, as needed. The cells that are publishing or are subscribing may optionally be shaded to help identify them.

Commands are available to jump to the Last Cell, Go To a particular cell, display the Selected Cell, and Find a cell with particular text in it.

Rows and columns may be Inserted and Deleted; they may also be transposed (rows converted into columns and vice versa). Individual cells or groups of cells may be moved to new locations. The data in a selected group of rows can be sorted based on the contents of up to three columns (keys); each column may be sorted in ascending or descending order.

The contents of a cell or group of cells can be swiftly replicated with the Fill Right and Fill Down commands. When a cell containing data and the cells to its right or below it are selected and a Fill command is executed, the data in the first cell is copied into the remaining cells; formulas are adjusted so that the formula applies to cells in the same relative manner. If a cell location refer-

enced in a formula is not to be adjusted relatively, a "\$" placed before the column name and/or row name tells QCC that part or all of the cell name is fixed.

A nifty feature is the ability to attach a Note to any cell. The notes document anything that your heart desires. An option is available to place a small red marker in the upper right corner of any cell containing a note.

A generous assortment of Functions is provided. There are mathematical and geometrical, financial, boolean, string, date, selection, and constant functions. The manual lists 74 different functions available for your enjoyment and edification.

QCC has three different types of charts available for use: pie charts, line charts, and bar charts.

A pie chart is plotted based on one row or column of data; I plotted a pie chart with 13 elements in it. Each section of the pie is shown in a different color, making it easy to distinguish the areas of the pie. As an option, the text in one row or column can be used to label the pie chart. If the labels are enabled, the percentage of the pie represented by each slice is also shown. Three sub-

types of the pie chart are available. The pie can be displayed, in effect, parallel to the plane of the screen, tilted, and tilted with a shadow (to provide the illusion of depth).

Bar charts are plotted based on one to four rows of data. Columns of data are not supported; a spreadsheet with columns of data must be transposed before it can be plotted. The data may be plotted in separate, sideby-side bars or in stacked bars and with or without a depth effect (like the shadow mode of the pie chart). In either case, each row in the spreadsheet is represented in a distinct color. Labels for the data may be provided in the row and column flanking the data.

A 3D bar chart capability is also available. A data set with special properties is needed if the 3D bar chart is to make any sense; data must be available which describes a distribution of some kind over an area divided into discrete parts. For example, to plot the population density of West Saint Paul on a block by block basis, the location of each block provides the horizontal (x and y) coordinates and the number of people living on the block is represented by the vertical (z) coordinate.

Line charts are also plotted based

on one to four rows of data. Once again, columns of data are not supported; a spreadsheet with columns of data must be transposed before it can be plotted. The data points may be plotted as dots, as crosses, or as boxes. The data points may appear without any interconnecting lines, with a line connecting each set of points, or with a line calculated to "fit" each set of points.

"Two dimensional" line charts are also supported for up to three sets of data. QCC allows a fourth set of data to be used as the horizontal coordinates for the other three sets of data; the data is plotted as pairs of points. This capability permits you to plot data collected over time as if the data was repetitive. For example, you can plot your utility bills as a function of the months of the year; all of the data for a given month appears at the same point on the horizontal scale. There may be a bug in the labeling of the horizontal axis; QCC tries to put all of the label data along the axis instead of using only one set of the repeating labels.

A 3D line chart capability is also available. As for the 3D bar charts, a data set with special properties is needed if the chart is to make any

QCC prints both spreadsheets and charts to ImageWriters, laserwriters, ink jets, and the wide variety of other printers compatible with the Apple IIGS.

There is no user control over the printing of charts. The colors, fonts, text size, and text location cannot be adjusted. The overall size of the chart is set by the program. You have very little control over the labelling of the axes. A title for the chart is not permitted. If the charts are saved on disk as super high resolution (SHR) graphic files, however, you can use a

program such as Platinum Paint to customize the charts. Other applications like GraphicWriter can import the charts to use them in papers or presentations.

Quick Click Calc is compatible with AppleWorks 3.0 spreadsheet files (QCC will import them) and imports and exports tab delimited ASCII files. Files that are stored may be password protected and may be encrypted; of course, if you forget the password to an encrypted file, your data is lost forever.

QCC comes with a very good manual and sample spreadsheets. One chapter, "The Spreadsheet Cookbook," steps you through the creation of

several spreadsheets; it covers most of the important concepts involved in the use of spreadsheets. The transfer of data from one spreadsheet to another through publishing and subscribing to editions is described in the cookbook. The command and function reference sections of the manual are well written and informative.

There are several improvements I would like to see in Quick Click Calc. The horizontal scrolling speed is annoyingly slow when you have a series of cells in which to enter data (I was using a 6.25 megaHertz TransWarp GS accelerator). The Random function either crashes the

program or slows the program down so much that it appears to crash. When I transposed a spreadsheet from one with many columns and few rows to one with many rows and few columns, a couple of the cells ended up in the wrong locations. I was completely befuddled by the way the program operates when one of the Preferences is set to "Use arrows as Cell movement keys". Every now and then as I tried to move around in the cell array. I found myself editing the data in a cell instead of moving from cell to cell. I tried hitting Escape and using Undo and Delete to extricate myself from Edit mode, most often with

> unsuccessful results. I finally set the Preference to "Use arrows as Formula edit keys" to remedy the situation. Although the font and size of spreadsheet data can be controlled, there is no capability to control the pattern used to print color data on a black and white printer; one color can be impossible to distinguish from another. A Replace capability would be a nice accompaniment for the Find command. One should be able to use the cursor to point to the new location of data which is being moved. More control over the format of a chart would be a great addition.

QCC is an impressive program that has some pretty impressive

competition in AppleWorks (I have never used AppleWorks GS so I cannot compare it with QCC. QCC, however, is being supported and AWGS is not). The preceding paragraphs have described many, but by no means all, of QCC's features. These features, especially the charts, make it a very appealing program. The compatibility with GSOS and the ability to use any printer con-

nected to the GS are also advantages. QCC does not have a macro capability similar to that of AppleWorks; this is a strong reason for sticking with AppleWorks.

If you need QCC's charting abilities and its GSOS compatibility, by all means, invest in it. If the macro capabilities of AppleWorks and the integration of the spreadsheet with the word processor and the data base

are of most importance, it's hard to go wrong with AppleWorks, especially version 5.1. If you are able to have the best of both worlds, get them both! You won't be sorry.
