# **Digital Cameras and Old Powerbooks**

Want to get one of those new digital cameras but don't have a place to store all the pictures you plan to take on that vacation to Duluth or the Mediterranean? Have an older PowerBook you'd like to use with that new digital camera but it doesn't have a USB or a FireWire connection? There are things you can do to combine that new camera and the old PowerBook.

There are two styles of adapters that permit you to easily transfer images from your digital camera to your old PowerBook. One of the adapters fits into the 3.5 inch floppy disk drive of your PowerBook: the second slides into the PCMCIA or PC slot.

The floppy drive adapter has electronic circuitry within it that transfers the data from the SmartMedia or CompactFlash storage media card as if the data had been stored on a 3.5 inch floppy. Your computer is fooled into thinking it is receiving data from a 3.5 inch floppy. Because the data transfer is handled like a floppy drive transfer, the data is transferred at a rate appropriate for floppy drives. The floppy adapter has a battery or two to provide power for the electronic circuitry.

The PC adapter's electronic circuit transfers the card data via the PowerBook's PC bus. The PC bus provides power to the adapter so no batteries are needed. Since the PC bus has a fairly high data transfer rate, it takes less time to move the data from the card to the PowerBook than it does through a floppy disk port. A Type II PC card adapter is a very convenient way to transfer pictures to your old PowerBook from a SmartMedia or CompactFlash card.

A PC adapter costs around \$40. There are adapters made by several manufacturers available from web-based retailers like MacMall. Local retailers also sell PC adapters. CompUSA sells an adapter made by Antec. At a place like CompUSA, you will need to buy the adapter from the IBM-compatible counter. The salesmen will tell you their adapter is not compatible with a Macintosh (that's what they told me), but that is not true. With the File Exchange control panel in place, your Mac can access the image data through the adapter with no problem. If you have any doubts, take your PowerBook and your storage media card with images to the store with you and verify the adapter works correctly (at CompUSA, they let me try the adapter before I bought it).

With the storage media card inserted into the adapter and the adapter inserted into one of the PC slots in the side of your PowerBook, a PC-formatted disk shows up on your desktop. On a 1400, the disk is named "untitled." Double-click on "untitled" to open it: inside the "untitled" folder is a folder named "DCIM." With our Olympus digital camera, when we double-click on "DCIM" we reveal a folder named "100OLYMP." Doubleclicking on "100OLYMP" reveals all the images stored by the digital camera. Select all the images (enter command-A) and drag them to the desktop or to a folder you have established previously. Your images are now ready for processing. You can use the Mac to delete the images from the storage media card; select the images to be deleted, drag them to the trash or use the contextual menu to send them to the trash, but be sure that you empty the trash before you eject the card. You can, if you prefer, use your camera to delete the images after you return the SmartMedia or CompactFlash to the camera.

Since each set of images you transfer may occupy as much as 128 megabytes (MB) of storage on your PowerBook, you need to have lots of space available on the PowerBook's hard drive. Our PowerBook had a 2.1 gigabyte (GB) hard drive that was more than 50% utilized by programs and data for those programs. It seemed like more space would be needed to store three or four weeks of vacation photos, so I bought a 10 GB drive from MCE Technologies on the internet; the hard drive came with clear installation instructions and an adapter for mounting the hard drive in the same location as the old drive. I transferred all important data to a desktop computer, installed the new

hard drive, formatted it, installed the operating system and applications, and moved the data back from the desktop machine. The upgraded 1400 works very well. If you buy a new hard drive but aren't confident enough to exchange the hard drive yourself and you don't want to pay a dealer to do the installation for you, the hardware gurus at the Vintage Mac/Apple Special Interest Group (SIG) may be willing to help make the exchange. Call the SIG leader (see the newsletter cover for the name and phone number) and indicate your interest in attending the SIG and obtaining their help. Before going to the meeting, make sure to copy all your data to another medium (another hard drive, a Zip disk, a CD, and so forth). If there is time and you bring your operating system and application installation CDs to the meeting, you may also be able to get your software re-installed.

If your "old" PowerBook is a G3 or G4 machine capable of running iPhoto, you can use that program to manipulate your images. If you aren't lucky enough to have a fairly new "old" PowerBook, Adobe's Photoshop Elements is an excellent application for working with your pictures. Even if you have iPhoto available, you might want to have Elements' processing power available to you. You can use Elements to lighten and darken, change contrast, crop, remove blemishes, and add special effects to your pictures; it performs many other operations as well. Photoshop Elements has a list price of \$99; it is available through the internet or at MicroCenter, CompUSA, or the Apple store.

Working with pictures requires a lot of processing power and happens more efficiently when lots of memory is available. If your PowerBook takes a long, long time to process a picture and you would like to speed things up, the first thing to try is to add some memory; the more memory you add, the fewer times the operating system must slow down the processing by using the hard drive for "virtual" memory. The hardware gurus at the Vintage Mac/Apple SIG can be consulted relative to how much memcontinued on page 11

If your PowerBook still does not have enough punch to modify pictures quickly enough back at the motel or condominium, you can install an accelerator. Accelerators replace the old PowerBook processor card with a newer, faster, more powerful processor. Accelerators come in a wide vari-

ety of models and a given PowerBook may be able utilize several different models. You will need to explore the possibilities and decide how much processing power you need and how much money [\$150 - \$600] you are willing to spend (those hardware gurus mentioned before may be able to offer some advice). In some cases, it may be better to buy a new machine rather than update an old one; because an accelerator does not speed up the memory and input/output

buses the processor uses to talk to the rest of the world, an old machine with a 500 MHz processor will not complete a job as quickly as a new PowerBook with a 500 MHz processor. The choice is yours.

That old machine of yours can be very useful and help you conserve your resources. Give it a try.
