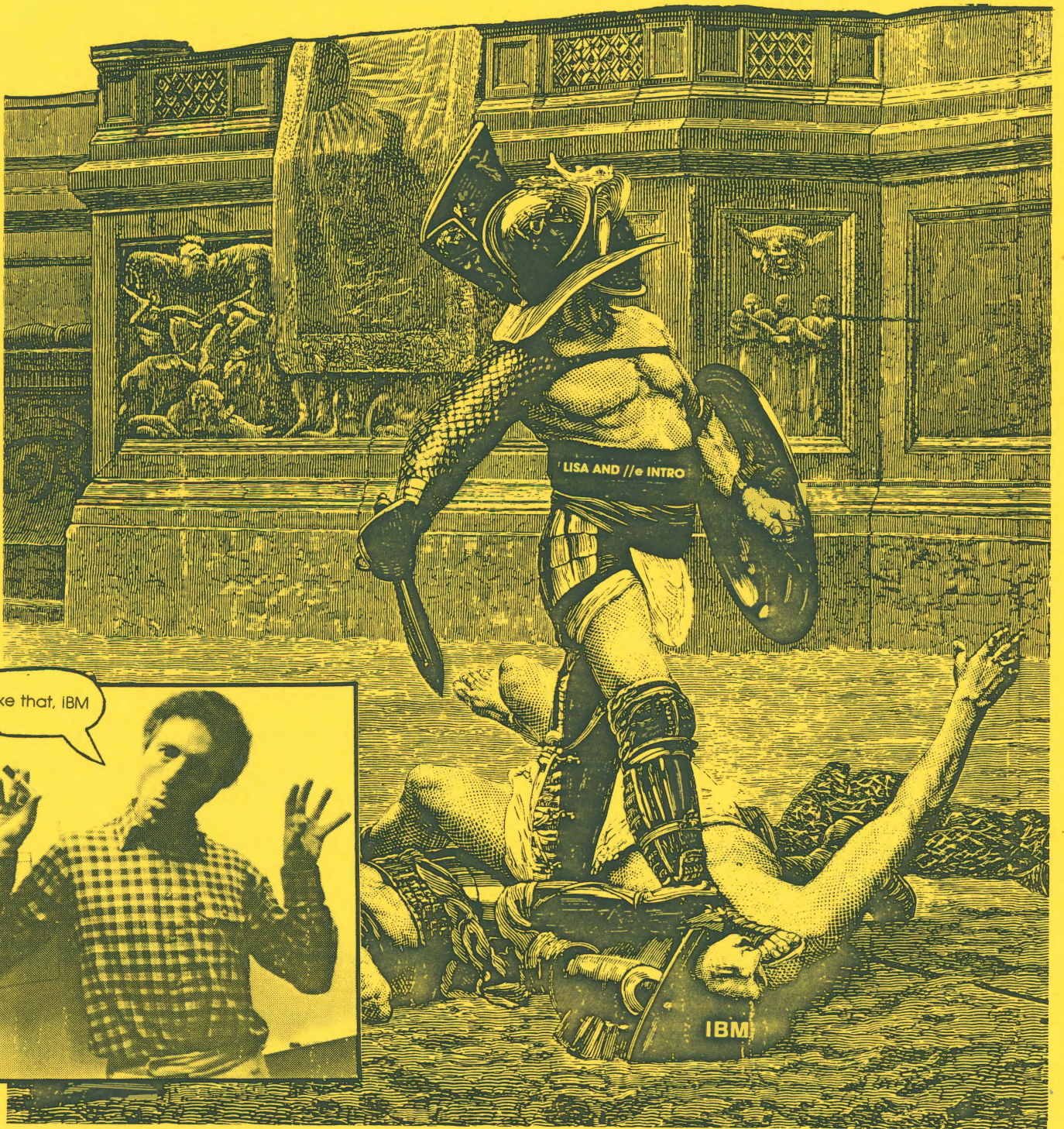

Besides the Apple II Plus, Jesse got a color monitor, a printer, a variety of software, and materials for a special desk and contoured chair that his father is building for him. 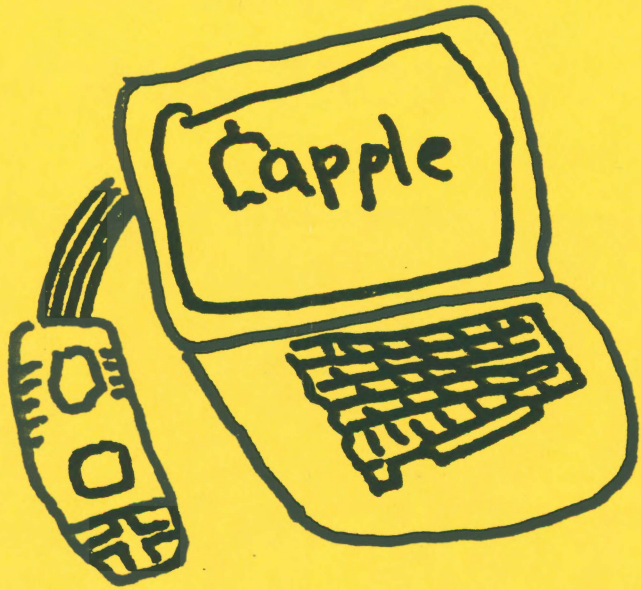

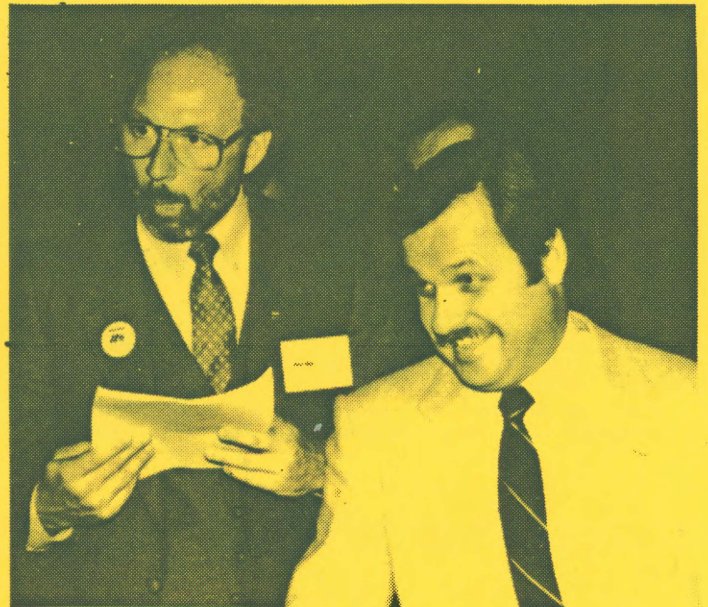

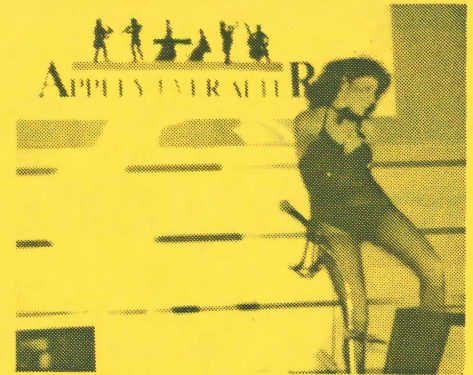

SOFTWARE LIBRARY IS OPEN

The Apple Library now has a Software Resource Center. For your browsing and borrowing pleasure, just visit the library, located on the first floor of the Mariani building, or call in your requests on x2400, 2048, or 3171.

We encourage employees to try as many programs as they wish. The temptation is great, because we have almost 600 software programs. They are cataloged by subject and vendor name, which is an invaluable aid when you need to search for a specific program or a functional category. Software reviews from various computer journals and handbooks are available, and we encourage employees to submit reviews of their own.

Best of all, in addition to Apple and third-party programs, hardware is available for loan. We have an Apple II, Apple ///, graphics tablet, language cards, clocks, color monitor, modems, and more.

WISHWARE

Does anyone know how I can electronically transmit a drawing?

I create assembly procedures for the Peripheral Division. With existing equipment, I am able to instantly update the text of my procedures worldwide, via the satellite. However, for every sheet of text that I produce, there is an accompanying "how to" drawing which must move from here to Singapore, through the mail, on a second-wave piece of paper.

Here's the rub. A video camera looks at an analog scene and, somewhere in its guts, transforms what it sees into a digital signal that can be recorded on tape and transmitted. When that digital signal is received, it can reproduce the original scene, but the Apple II's "high resolution page" doesn't have enough room to hold one-sixth of the information needed to do this work. It occurs to me that we must already be doing this within Apple. I'd like to know how.

Additionally, how can I print out VisiCalc graphs? I make the graphs using asterisks--or any other appropriate symbol--one per template cell. Does anybody know how to do this? With Business Graphics, perhaps?
